Adam Pendleton: Becoming Imperceptible was organized by the Contemporary Art Center New Orleans in 2017 as the first major exhibition of Pendleton's work. The exhibition traveled to MCA Denver and the Museum of Contemporary Art Cleveland. Read reviews in Hyperallergic, CAA Reviews, the Pelican Bomb, and Burnaway.

<u>Adam Pendleton: Elements of Me</u> was on display at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in 2020, the first in a series of three exhibitions exploring race and representation in American art.

Adam Pendleton: Paper was at Pace Gallery Palm Beach in 2021, concurrently on display with Art Basel Miami Beach and New Wave Art WKND.

In 2021, the Museum of Modern Art in New York installed <u>Adam Pendleton: Who is Queen?</u>, a monumental, floor-to-ciling installation in the Marron Family Atrium. Listen to a <u>podcast</u> series associated with the project, including conversations with the artist and writers, theorists, philosophers, and musicians. <u>Adam Pendleton: In Abstraction</u> was at Pace Gallery Geneva in 2023, his first solo exhibition in that city. The exhibition was presented concurrently with Galerie Eva Presenhuber's exhibition, <u>Adam Pendleton: Toy Soldier</u>, in Zurich.

Mumok in Vienna installed <u>Adam Pendleton: Blackness, White, and Light</u> in 2023 as his first extensive solo exhibition in Europe. Read a studio visit and interview with Alexandra Markl for Collectors Agenda.

In 2023, the Mildred Lane Kemper Art Museum had <u>Adam Pendleton: To Divide By</u> on view in their galleries. Watch a public program <u>Q&A</u> produced by the museum on YouTube.

Pace Gallery installed <u>Adam Pendleton: An Abstraction</u> in 2024. Read an interview about the exhibition, Pendleton's first solo show in the gallery's New York space in ten years, in <u>Essense</u>. Another interview was published in the <u>New York Times</u>.

"Black Dada is a way to talk about the future while talking about the past. It's about looking at Blackness as an open-ended idea that is not just related to notions of race. It looks at Blackness in relationship to politics, in relationship to art, in relationship more specifically with the avant-garde." - Adam Pendleton, 2021

Born and raised in Richmond, Virginia, Adam Pendleton moved to New York at the age of 18 to become an artist. He quickly gained attention and became the youngest artist represented by Pace Gallery in 2012. **Black Dada (K)** is part of an ongoing series that explores the intersection of Blackness and abstraction. The bright blue color and graffiti-like lines are in sharp contrast with the letter "K" in sans-serif font. Letters can be found throughout Pendleton's paintings in this series, which altogether spell "BLACK DADA."
