Active in Pisa and Bologna, Francesco Traini was a 14th-century Italian artist whose hand has been attributed to a number of altarpieces and frescoes. He is most well-known for his one signed artwork, a triptych depicting scenes from the life of Saint Dominic. Here, Traini depicts Saint Catherine of Alexandria, who was tortured upon a spiked wheel after refusing to renounce her faith. In one hand, she cradles the wheel in question; in the other, she holds a book, which is likely a reference to Catherine's status as patron saint of scholars, as well as her own learned background. While Traini was active during the Trecento, a period of Italian art that would eventually transition into the increasingly fluid and naturalistic style of the Renaissance, the gilded background indicates some lingering influence of Orthodox and Byzantine styles on 14th-century Italian art.
