




Maurer, Self-Portrait, 1897

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Alfred Maurer (American, 1868-1932) **Four Sisters**, 1931

Born and raised in New York City, Alfred Maurer moved to Paris in 1897 and became interested in the emerging Modernist movements of the early 20th century. At the outbreak of World War I, Maurer was forced to return to the United States, where he continued to connect with American painters such as Marsden Hartley (1877-1943) and Arthur Dove (1880-1946). **Four Sisters** depicts the four elongated figures in bright, jewel-toned dresses. Maurer often painted women in pairs later in his career, embracing a bold experimentation with color and form that made a significant impact on the development of American Modernism.
