<u>Diane Arbus: American Portraits</u> was on view at the National Gallery of Australia in 2016, utilizing the museum's impressive collection of Arbus's work.

In 2016, *Diane Arbus: In the Beginning* was at the <u>Metropolitan Museum of Art</u> in New York, focusing on the first seven years of her career, from 1956 to 1962, and featuring never-before-seen works from the Museum's Diane Arbus Archive. The exhibition then traveled to the <u>San Francisco Museum of Modern Art</u>.

The Art Gallery of Ontario launched <u>Diane Arbus: Photographs, 1956-1971</u> in 2020. The museum has the second largest collection of Arbus photographs in the world.

Diane Arbus is one of the most influential American photographers of the 20th century. She was interested in depicting people outside the New York social establishment, often photographing on the street, in the park, or in her subjects' houses and workplaces. **Child with a toy hand grenade in Central Park, N.Y.C.** is one of her iconic works. A young boy (named Colin Wood) looks directly at the camera, making a face he said was "imitating a face I'd seen in war movies" and holding a toy hand grenade. The photograph teeters between childhood play and violence, with a cool commentary on the social and political upheaval of the 1960s.
