In 2023, Mohammed Sami: The Point 0 was on view at Camden Art Centre as the artist's first institutional solo exhibition in the UK. The exhibition debuted a series of major new paintings and was accompanied by the first dedicated monograph of the artist's work. Born and raised in Bagdad, Mohammed Sami was nineteen when the US-led military coalition invaded Iraq. He immigrated to Sweden and then to the United Kingdom, where he attended the Belfast School of Art and Goldsmiths College. His paintings explore the trauma of the Iraq conflict through semi-abstract compositions that navigate the tension between memory and actual events of wartime life. A Single Bed was painted the same year Sami graduated with his MFA. The artist has since received wide acclaim, and he is one of four nominees for the 2025 Turner Prize, Britain's most prestigious award for emerging artists.
