Watch a [2023 talk](#) given by art historian Gail Levin at the Muscarelle Museum of Art at William & Mary entitled “Abstract Artist Lynne Mapp Drexler’s Journey from Virginia to Maine.”

The Farnsworth Museum opened [Lynne Drexler: Color Notes](#) in 2024, displaying the museum’s recently conserved paintings by the artist alongside loans from institutions and private collections that capture her pivotal work from the 1960s. In 2025, Berry Campbell launched [Lynne Drexler: A Painted Aria](#), exploring the season of Drexler’s career when she attended the Metropolitan Opera three times a week and music became inseparable from her practice.

White Cube installed concurrent exhibitions in 2025: [Lynne Drexler: The Sixties](#) at their London space and [Lynne Drexler: The Seventies](#) at the Hong Kong location. The earlier works were paintings, works on paper, and mixed media collages that had never been previously exhibited; the works from the 1970s were those the artist termed “paintings and drawings with the aura of landscapes.”

Elizabeth Moss Galleries published a [virtual exhibition](#) entitled *Interior Warmth: The Still Lives of Lynne Drexler* in 2026.

Lynne Mapp Drexler was born in Newport News, Virginia and enjoyed painting and music from an early age. She decided to become an artist in her late 20s, when she moved to New York and enrolled in classes with the influential abstract painter Hans Hofmann (1880-1966). By the late 1950s, Drexler was counted among a group of influential women working in Abstract Expressionism and the New York School. **Floral Water** was painted in a season of travel for the artist, when she and her husband spent time in Mexico, Hawaii, California, and Monhegan Island in Maine. She later reflected: "I've always felt deeply within myself that I was a damn good artist, though the world didn't recognize me as such. I wasn't about to play their game."
