In 2015, *Kehinde Wiley: A New Republic* was organized by the [Brooklyn Museum](#) as a major mid-career retrospective. The exhibition featured sixty works spanning fourteen years and traveled to the [Seattle Art Museum](#), the [Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth](#), the [Virginia Museum of Fine Arts](#), and the [Phoenix Art Museum](#). The Obama Portraits Tour began at the [Art Institute of Chicago](#) in 2021 and traveled institutions including the [Museum of Fine Arts, Houston](#), the [Museum of Fine Arts, Boston](#), the [High Museum of Art](#), the [Brooklyn Museum](#), the [de Young Museum](#), and [LACMA](#).

In 2021, the National Gallery in London launched the exhibition [Kehinde Wiley: The Prelude](#). “What is portraiture? It’s a choice. It’s the ability to position your body in the world to celebrate you on your own terms.” Kehinde Wiley adapts the heroic style of European portraiture and Old Master paintings to contemporary Black figures. Perhaps best known for his presidential portrait of former President Barack Obama, Wiley also features people he meets on the streets of New York and Los Angeles. **Portrait of Kaysy J. Gotay II** presents the subject as confident and self-assured, standing in a highly detailed garden setting. Like many of Wiley’s works that engage with the complexities of post-colonial identity, race, and visual culture, the composition is inspired by historical materials. In this painting, the surrounding pattern is from an Indian design reproduced in a 1735 book entitled *Book of Chinese Design taken from the originals of Persia, of the Indies, of China and of Japan* by Jean Antoine Fraise.
